Dear Mr. Bernal:

On April 24, 2017, there was a joint meeting of the City Commission of the City of Brownsville and the Brownsville Public Utilities Board (BPUB). The Board agreed to provide the City Commission a monthly electric bill comparison between BPUB and other area Investor-Owned Utilities, Electric Coops, and Retail Electric Providers.

Enclosed for your information is the April 2022 electric bill comparison between BPUB and other area electric providers. BPUB's April 2022 bill for the average residential customer using 1,000 kWh was \$113.03. This monthly bill consists of three bill components as follows:

Customer Service Charge	\$ 6.94
Base Rates	65.54
Fuel & Purchase Energy Charge	40.55
Total:	\$ 113.03

BPUB has maintained a bill reduction program since March 2016 by utilizing available funds. Due to rising fuel costs, in October 2021, the BPUB Board approved a plan to begin increasing the monthly FPEC rate in order to recover these additional costs.


